- Pregnant or parenting (under 20 years)
- Are of have been in Adelaide Youth Training Centre
- A recently arrived refugee
- same sex attracted and/or gender diverse (under 18 years)
- Homeless.

Headspace

Headspace is the National Youth Mental Health Foundation providing early intervention mental health services to 12-25 year olds, along with assistance in promoting young peoples' wellbeing. This covers four core areas: mental health, physical health, work and study support and alcohol and other drug services.

Information and services for young people, their families and friends as well as health professionals can be accessed through headspace. Headspace centres are located across metropolitan, regional and rural areas of Australia. They are built and designed with input from young people so they don't have the same look or feel as other clinical services. The centres are there to help people access health workers – whether it's a GP, psychologist, social worker, alcohol and drug worker, counsellor, vocational worker or youth worker.

Services at a headspace centre are either free, or have a low cost. You can ask if there is a cost when you make your appointment. Some services require you to have a referral from a doctor; but don't worry headspace can help you with this as well.

Kids help line

Kids Helpline is Australia's only free, private, and confidential 24/7 phone and online counselling service for young people aged 5 to 25. Counselling is currently offered by phone 1800 55 1800

You can talk about anything! Maybe something has happened at home or school and you're not sure what to do about it. You might be feeling sad, scared, angry, lonely, or just want to talk to somebody who understands.

Young people contact kids help line about all kinds of things including friendships and relationships, family issues, bullying and cyberbullying, school and study stress, gender identity, sexuality, mental health, feeling sad or upset, body issues, or because they're feeling unsafe.

There's no issue too big or too small that they can't support you with. They are there to help.

Life line

Anyone across Australia experiencing a personal crisis or thinking about suicide can contact Lifeline. Regardless of age, gender, ethnicity, religion or sexual orientation our trained volunteers are ready to listen, provide support and referrals.

If you are Aboriginal or a Torres Strait Islander person who wants to quit smoking, the Quitline has Aboriginal counsellors available to support you.

SHine SA

SHine SA provides confidential information on sexual and reproductive health issues.

You can go to the Shine SA website or contact the Sexual Health line about any sexual health issue, including:

- contraception
- fertility issues
- · period problems
- pregnancy options
- safer sex information
- sexual health checks
- sexual relationship problems
- sexually transmitted infections

Questions can be answered by an experienced sexual health nurse who can also refer individuals to other health services if ongoing support is required.

To see a doctor at SHINE SA, you will need a Medicare card. If you are 30 or under or a Health Care Card holder, you will be bulk-billed. If you are over 30, you will be required to pay for the consultation in full and claim the refundable amount from Medicare.

International students, travellers and people without Medicare cards are required to pay up-front and claim the costs of the consultation and consumables from their private health insurance. SA Pathology will directly bill people without Medicare cards. (Hardship consideration applies)
