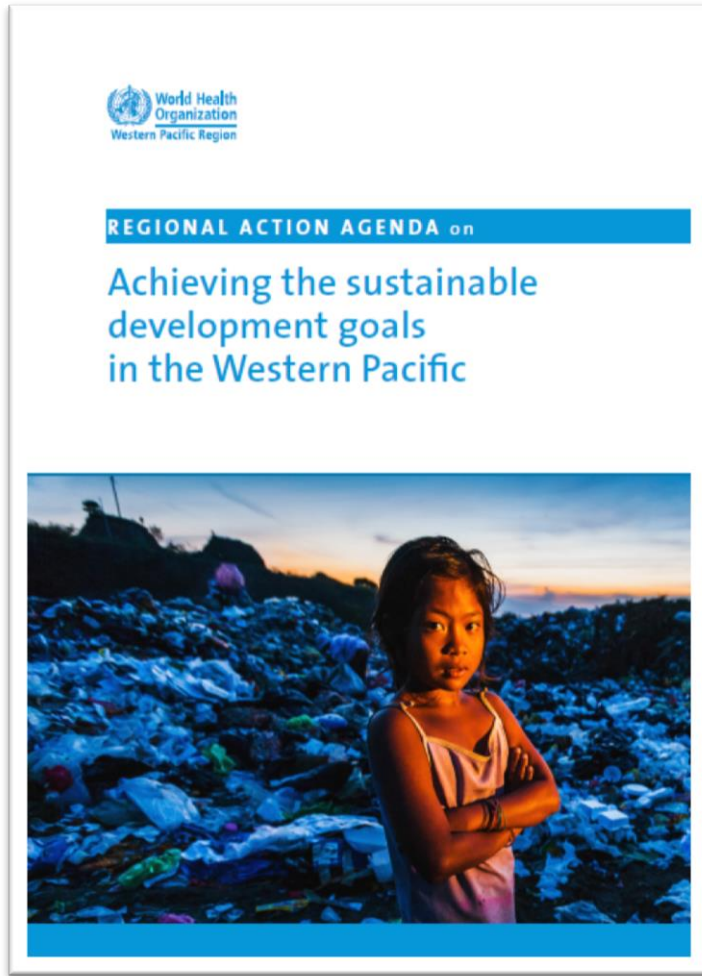


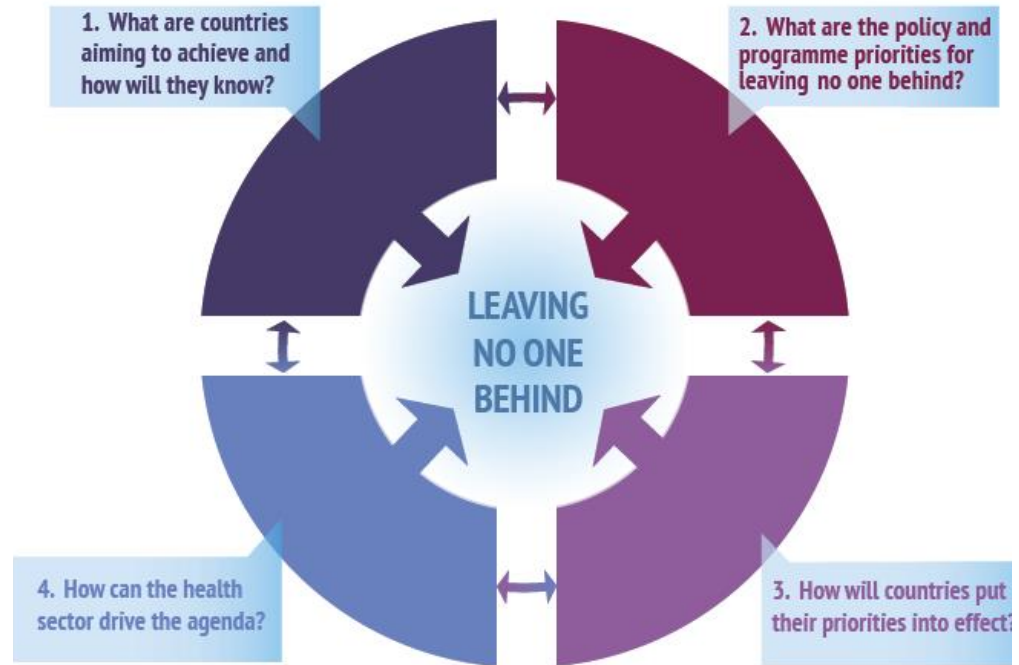
Achieving the SDGs in the Western Pacific

- 3) How will countries put their priorities into effect?
- 4) How can the health sector drive the agenda?
