From the Presiding Members

The Lower North Health Advisory Council (LNHAC) have had a very busy 2018-19 vear.

The LNHAC have been supporting the Clare, Snowtown and Burra Hospital's with a number of renovations, refurbishments and purchases of equipment.

- Kara House, Clare, has had air conditioning units installed at a cost of \$35,000.
- Clare hospital maternity services have taken delivery of a brand new birthing bed at a cost of \$11,000.
- Snowtown Hospital accident and emergency has had ceiling repairs undertaken costing \$19,000.
- Leumeah Home (Snowtown) has also undergone refurbishment and renovations.
- Burra Hospital has received replacement guttering, ceiling replacement in the meeting room and new floor coverings. Total cost for these works is approximately \$70,150.

The LNHAC has also supported the hospital auxiliary to create an arid zone garden at Burra Hospital. We have also provided funding of \$5000 per annum for 3 years, to Ms Sarah Bond to assist with her gaining her physiotherapy degree at university.

The monthly meetings have seen an array of guest speakers. These have included the local Primary Health Network, Drug and Alcohol services, a representative from Uniting Care Westley speaking about homelessness in the area. SA Police Sergeant from Snowtown and Burra discussing drug and alcohol matters. Representatives from the Australian Government Medical Benefits Division discussing the new private health care changes as well as the Bendigo Bank regarding processes involved in opening a local branch in Burra.

The members of the HAC regularly undertake consumer surveys at Burra and Clare and are consistently receiving satisfactory feedback. The involvement of LNHAC members in the Men's Sheds is progressing well with members at Clare keen to extend the existing shed or find a new/larger premises. Burra members are applying for grants to extend the lunch room and the Snowtown group have recently secured funding from a grant to purchase a dust extractor.

Other initiatives that the Lower North HAC have been interested in are:

- Providing ongoing support to the Men's Shed's. The HAC feel that the men's sheds are an important men's health initiative.
- They are also investigating re-establishing the hospital auxiliaries. Currently only Burra Hospital has an auxiliary.
- The replacement of the roof on the RSL Building in Clare. The council view this building as a vital community asset and feel that it is being left to deteriorate.

- The required upgrade to the Clare emergency department. The LNHAC feel the current emergency department is substandard and not meeting community or hospital staff needs.
- Concern regarding the increasing mental health issues faced by youth and increased recreational drug use.
- The rising level of homeless people in the lower north area.

The LNHAC look forward to a strong working relationship with the new Yorke and Northern Local Health Network (YNLHN) Governing Board and would like to see members or a member attend board meetings and report back to the LNHAC.

We also look forward to working relationships with other HAC's in the YNLHN and stronger links with our local communities. The LNHAC are considering the possibility of \$2 million of the aged care deposit money, allocated against Leumeah home, to be used for Snowtown. This request is from the Yorke and Northern Executive.

The LNHAC also look forward to the forthcoming year, supporting the Clare, Burra and Snowtown Hospitals by approving the 2019-20 respective sites wish list for equipment and repairs.
