Outpatient service information, triage and referral guidelines

Description of service:

The objective of patients visiting the dermatology outpatients is for the assessment of patients living with skin disorders.

Priority Service is provided to:

- psoriasis
- Systemic skin conditions
- lymphomas
- > Complex skin disease, such as severe eczema / > Moderate and severe skin disease unresponsive to first line management
 - > Patients requiring complex drugs
 - Skin malignancies melanoma and NMSC, skin > Skin surveillance for high risk transplant patients

Exclusions:

- Referrals for outpatient appointments from the Emergency Department will not be accepted
- Referrals for routine skin checks or cosmetic procedures will not be accepted
- Indefinite referrals will not be accepted
- **Paediatrics**
- Overseas students and visitors from countries who do not have a reciprocal health care agreement with Australia.
- Compensable patients e.g. WorkCover

Clinical

- > Reason for referral
- > Duration of symptoms
- > Relevant pathology and imaging reports
- > Past medical history
- > Current medications

| Dermatological emergencies with threat to major organs. e.g. erythroderma who is hemodynamically unstable Severe skin infections e.g. eczema herpeticum. Severe widespread blistering/pustular disease (>10% denuded skin) e.g. drug eruptions, toxic epidermal necrolysis, Steven Johnson syndrome Acute deterioration of a stable blistering/pustular disorder | New onset of erythroderma (haemodynamically stable) Diagnosis of melanoma/non-melanoma skin cancer (NMSC) Bullous pemphigoid/pemphigu s or other autoimmune blistering diseases. | Suspected non-melanoma skin cancers Suspected dysplastic naevi Symptomatic extensive inflammatory dermatoses – new onset but patient hemodynamically stable Suspected infected dermatoses (excluding fungal infections) Melanomas requiring wider excision where primary completely excised Stable blistering disorders for diagnosis and management e.g. porphyria cutanea tarda Acute exacerbation of eczema/psoriasis with >90% skin involvement.
