#### • Act as an advocate to promotion the interests of the community

Held an Engagement planning meeting in 20 February 2018 with a wide range of consumers from social groups, support networks, Nunyara, Aged Care and Disability providers. This enabled the participants to raise issues, suggestions and ideas on the provision of health services. After this meeting representatives that were present were able to take back information regarding the role of HAC to their groups and to engage with us outside of this meeting

• Provide advice about relevant aspect of the provision of health services, and relevant health issues, goals, priorities, plans and strategic initiatives

HAC members are encouraged to participate and provide feedback to the Port Augusta & Whyalla Health Service Planning Steering Group for future health services in our region.

• Encourage community participation in programs

Events and meetings in the community can be placed on the Whyalla HAC Facebook page. Invite and encourage community members to become volunteers in the hospital and become involved in the various areas such as Cancer Resource Centre and Cancer Support Network. A volunteer from the Cancer Resource was encouraged and invited to provide information of the services available via a SA Health website video. A group of volunteers were encouraged to assist with updating signage in the old and new sections of the hospital. Volunteers also assisted with preparing signs for lamination. HAC members assist with the co-facilitation of the Service Matters - Going the Extra Mile in-service training. A NAIDOC award was presented to volunteers involved with this program delivery.

• **Consult with other bodies that are interested in the provision of health services** Several HAC members are members of the Whyalla Cancer Network This is felt to be an important link given we have a Regional Cancer Centre in the hospital. The network meet once a month with various cancer support groups and offering support in the Cancer Resource Centre to cancer patients and their families.

A newsletter is received from Health Consumers Alliance with feedback encouraged. Consumers are invited to sit on Government committees and provide feedback to issues raised in the newsletter.

HAC members along with Cancer Support Network members were Invited to attend a Systemic Cancer Treatment Services Consultation workshop with Cancer Council SA via Video Conference.

Group letters sent to the Minister with regard to issues affecting the Flinders and Upper North Region such as the new Board appointments.

• Participate in consultation or assessment process associated with the selection of senior staff

A HAC representative is invited to sit and actively participate on a panel to determine the appointment of senior staff member positions.

### • Provide advice about the management of resources for health services; and provide assistance with fundraising activities

As we have several community groups we as a HAC do not conduct fundraising activities. We have been made aware of various pieces of equipment that would enable patients to have tests provided locally or provide an improved service to local patients. Groups such as the Whyalla Hospital Ladies Auxiliary, Heartbeat and Pink Spirits have been encouraged to support the purchase of this equipment. The value and usage of equipment purchased is determined with the assistance of senior management before any purchase is made.
