	The Controlled Substances Advisory Council must, not later than 31 October in each year, report to the Minister on the administration and operation of this Act during the previous financial year.

The Advisory Council convened three times during the reporting period. The meetings were held in July 2020, December 2020 and June 2021 and considered a range of matters, including of note:

• Regulations to support Real Time Prescription Monitoring (RTPM) in South Australia and enable implementation of ScriptCheckSA, a clinical tool providing real-time monitored medicines prescription information for prescribers and pharmacists to support safer clinical decision-making.

Monitored Drugs, as defined by the Controlled Substances (Poisons) Regulations 2011 regulation 3(1) include:

- any S8 poison;
- any S4 poison that is a Benzodiazepine;
- any S4 poison that contains Codeine; and
- the following S4 poisons:
  - Gabapentin;
  - Pregabalin;
  - Quetiapine;
  - Tramadol;
  - Zolpidem;
  - Zopiclone.
- Regulations to impose secure storage requirements on injectable preparations of the drug pentobarbital, a highly concentrated, rapidly fatal drug that is most commonly used for the humane euthanasia of animals. This aligns with changes to the national Poisons Standard for pentobarbital injection that require

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pentobarbital injection to be kept in a locked container in addition to requirements that it be kept and out of public and unauthorised access.

- Regulations to manage the impact of serious medicines shortages. These
  provide for patients to receive a suitable substitute medicine from their
  pharmacist without delay when their prescribed medicine is in serious national
  shortage. The amendments support supply of a substitute medicine in
  accordance with a Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) Serious Shortage
  Medicine Substitution Notice (also known as Serious Scarcity Substitution
  Instrument). Supply of the substitute medicine must be in accordance with the
  conditions of the Notice/Instrument and the regulations.
- The declaration of the substance cumyl-pegaclone as a controlled drug. Cumylpegaclone is a synthetic cannabinoid and New Psychoactive Substance. It has established potential for abuse and has been synthesised for its psychoactive properties and recreational drug use. Consumption of cumyl-pegaclone has resulted in adverse health outcomes, with multiple presentations to emergency departments in metropolitan and regional hospitals in Australia.
- Recommended a review of administrative anomalies for some substances in Schedules to the Controlled Substances (Controlled Drugs, Precursors and Plants) Regulations 2014.
